Social Stories: A Simple Strategy that Works


"I can do things without help." So begins the morning slideshow in Team 2's room, a social story illustrated with photos of adult participants accomplishing tasks on their own, such as brushing their teeth, combing their hair or putting their lunch bag away. The narrative also touches on the themes of patience and waiting one's turn, helping others, accepting that sometimes plans change, and the importance of using words to express feelings. Seeing photos of their peers and talking about it together emphasizes positive behavior and independence.

Staff in both the Academy and the Adult Program use social stories as learning tools to help students and adults adjust to a new routine or experience, work through an issue, or change a behavior. The narrative uses positive language to offer cues and appropriate responses to social situations by using examples from a first-person point of view.

"We talk about the story and apply it to other situations, and it's working," said Sonia Vielot, a Team 2 staff member. After a few weeks of viewing the slideshow on a daily basis, Eve is able to wait a little longer for her turn, and use her words when she's upset. Jessie is also getting better at using words to express herself. Ronald can tell the group about the many things he can do by himself, and he understands better how not to interrupt when someone is talking. Repetition and encouragement have reinforced the positive changes.

Academy teachers also use social stories with their students. When Briana had an issue with hitting others when she was frustrated, her teacher, Mrs. LaPorta, wrote a short narrative naming Briana's friends, how her friends and teachers like it when she is nice to them, and how she earns the reward of her favorite song when she doesn't hit. Briana was able to change her behavior and show a greater sense of self-control, and there were fewer





disruptions in class. "It's a simple strategy," LaPorta said, "but it works."

Social stories can take many different forms, from a simple step-by-step pictorial or story created for a particular individual, to the slideshow that Team 2 views together on the interactive board.

"Sometimes too much spoken instruction can become confusing or distracting," said Brady Cronin, Director of the Adult Program. "Then simple visuals, like a picture schedule, can help individuals follow a sequence of events." Emily's daily schedule is a series of photos of herself doing various activities and she is able to direct herself to the next activity with minimal prompting. Jake has also learned to put his lunch and backpack away using a series of photos of him doing each step of the process.

"Used in the right way, social stories help our students and adults become more independent," Brady said. "That's what we're striving for."


Sr. Cheryl Driscoll: "The students were very responsive to whatever was asked of them. They are a caring and happy group!"
